

## Annual Management Report of Fund Performance

### Management Discussion of Fund Performance

#### Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Renaissance Canadian Growth Fund (the *Fund*) seeks to achieve long-term investment returns through capital growth, primarily in equity securities of large- to medium-sized Canadian issuers.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests primarily in issuers listed on Canadian exchanges and may also invest in securities of issuers located in other countries. Issuers will typically have an established record of earnings, financial strength, good management, and above-average relative growth potential, and will typically have a market capitalization of more than \$1 billion.

#### Risk

The Fund is a Canadian equity fund that is suitable for long term investors who can tolerate medium investment risk.

For the period ended August 31, 2024, the Fund's overall level of risk remained as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

#### Results of Operations

The Fund's portfolio advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (*CAMI*, the *Manager*, or *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended August 31, 2024. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 14% during the period, from \$1,289,723 as at August 31, 2023 to \$1,466,922 as at August 31, 2024. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$79,451, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 18.2% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Index (the *benchmark*), returned 18.8% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

The initiation of interest-rate cuts in Canada and the prospect of cuts in the U.S. continued to dictate the swings of interest-rate-sensitive stocks

as well as small-capitalization and growth stocks. With inflation moderating and unemployment rates ticking up, central banks started lowering interest rates, which provided a boost for equity markets.

Investor enthusiasm around artificial intelligence (AI) continued during the period. The demand for AI-enabling hardware and platforms continued to drive positive performance in the information technology sector.

Geopolitical tensions in Ukraine and the Middle East, as well as uncertainty regarding the outcome of the upcoming U.S. presidential election, continued to impact commodities and supply chains.

An underweight allocation to the outperforming materials sector detracted from the Fund's performance as many of the lowest-quality materials stocks saw significant rebounds. Stock selection within the energy and health care sectors also detracted from the Fund's performance.

A holding in First Quantum Minerals Ltd. detracted from the Fund's performance following the shutting down of the company's operating mine in Peru. The Fund's underweight allocations to TC Energy Corp. and Dollarama Inc. detracted from performance as both stocks performed well. An underweight holding in Eli Lilly and Co. was another notable detractor from performance. The company has been a beneficiary of the weight-loss trend through its drug, Mounjaro, and the company reported successful clinical trials of its drug, Kisunla, an Alzheimer's disease drug, which recently received approval.

The Fund's overweight allocation to the financials sector contributed to performance, as did stock selection within the financials, industrials and utilities sectors. Selection within the information technology and communication services sectors also contributed to the Fund's performance as the Portfolio Advisor focused on beneficiaries of AI. An underweight allocation to the real estate sector contributed to performance as well.

Overweight holdings in Trisura Group Ltd., Fairfax Financial Holdings Ltd. and Element Fleet Management Corp. contributed to the Fund's performance. Both Trisura Group and Fairfax Financial Holdings gained outsized earnings growth from strong pricing power as well as investment returns from high interest rates. Element Fleet Management

benefited from scale advantages as well as increased service offering and profitability. Another notable contributor to performance was Broadcom Inc., with its share price gains reflecting growth in AI.

The Portfolio Advisor eliminated a holding in Franco-Nevada Corp. in favour of a new holding in Osisko Gold Royalties Ltd. This maintains the Fund's gold exposure, but in the Portfolio Advisor's view, the asset base is of higher quality and in more favourable jurisdictions. Canadian Western Bank was added to the Fund in order to acquire National Bank of Canada at a compelling price. National Bank of Canada has the lowest price-to-earnings ratio of the big six Canadian banks and among the highest growth and return on equity.

A new holding in Oracle Corp. was introduced to the Fund based on the growth of Oracle Cloud Infrastructure and the resiliency of its legacy database business. However, the holding was later sold due to poor execution, suggesting that this growth may be at risk.

The Fund's holding in Enbridge Inc. was increased on bought deal financing. The deal came at a discount to the close, offering an attractive return. The company's shift in the business mix toward more natural gas and the added geographic diversification plus adding more utility-like returns makes sense to the Portfolio Advisor. A holding in Manulife Financial Corp. was increased as the Portfolio Advisor gained comfort with the risks following the partial sale of the company's long-term care book.

A holding in Magna International Inc. was eliminated from the Fund given the uncertainty of the company returning to consistent growth. The proceeds were directed to holdings in GFL Environmental Inc. and North American Construction Group Ltd. A holding in Tesla Inc. was eliminated from the Fund based on stalled growth in the electric vehicles market. Johnson & Johnson was sold given the lower probability of a corporate split.

A holding in Alimentation Couche-Tard Inc. was trimmed amid weakening same-store sales and fuel volumes. The company has had success in reducing costs and expanding margins, which has contributed to strong share performance. However, there does not appear to be a lot of room to further reduce costs.

### Recent Developments

The level of geopolitical risk disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. This has resulted in significant volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. It is unclear what further actions may be taken by governments and the resulting impact on global economies, businesses and financial markets. These factors may adversely affect the Fund's performance. The Manager continues to monitor ongoing developments and the impact to investment strategies.

### Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

#### *Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund*

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management

fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*.

The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain fund costs) in respect of the classes of units of the Fund (except Class O unit), which may include but are not limited to, operating and administrative costs; regulatory fees; audit, and legal fees and expenses; trustee, safekeeping, custodial, and any agency fees; and investor servicing costs and costs of unitholder reports, prospectuses, Fund Facts, and other reports, in exchange for the Fund paying a fixed rate administration fee (plus applicable GST/HST) to the Manager with respect to those classes of units. For Class O units, no fixed administration fee will be charged. The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain Fund costs) allocated to Class O units of the Fund. The fixed administration fee payable by the Fund, may, in any particular period, exceed or be lower than the expenses we incur in providing such services to the Fund.

As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

#### *Distributor*

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Securities Inc. (*CIBC SI*), the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (*CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (*CIBC WM*). CIBC SI, CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

#### *Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars*

The Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) when they process trades

through them. These types of goods and services for which the Portfolio Advisor or a portfolio sub-advisor may direct brokerage commissions are research goods and services and order execution goods and services, and are referred to in the industry as “soft-dollar” arrangements. These goods and services received through soft dollar arrangements assist the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) with investment decision-making services for the Fund, or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio advisory agreement and portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$114,878 to CIBC WM and \$1,410 to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

#### *Fund Transactions*

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (*inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

#### *Custodian*

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

#### *Service Provider*

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company Inc. (*CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

The management expense ratio includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds.

<sup>6</sup> The decision to waive management fees and/or fixed administration fees is at the discretion of the Manager. The practice of waiving management fees and/or fixed administration fees may continue indefinitely or may be terminated at any time without notice to unitholders. The management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds, where applicable.

<sup>7</sup> The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs before income taxes expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value during the period. Spreads associated with fixed income securities trading are not ascertainable and, for that reason, are not included in the trading expense ratio calculation. Previously, the trading expense ratio included the fees attributable to exchange traded funds which are now no longer included in the TER. Prior year fees attributable to exchange traded funds have been reclassified to the management expense ratio and management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions.

<sup>8</sup> The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the portfolio advisor and/or portfolio sub-advisor manages the portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to a fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by a fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

**Management Fees**

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended August 31, 2024. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.




### Past Performance

The Fund's returns are after the deduction of fees and expenses, and the difference in returns between classes of units is primarily due to differences in the management expense ratio. See *Financial Highlights* section for the management expense ratio.
