What does the fund invest in?

The fund invests in a portfolio consisting primarily of Canadian dollar-denominated bonds with an effective maturity in 2029. The Fund will terminate on or about November 30, 2029, or such earlier date upon not less than 60 days' notice to unitholders. Investment in securities of foreign issuers is not generally expected to exceed 10% of the net asset value of the fund at the time that securities of the foreign issuers are purchased.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

CIBC Asset Management Inc. has rated the volatility of this fund as Low.

Because this is a new fund, the risk rating is only an estimate by CIBC Asset Management Inc. Generally, the rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It does not tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

Who is this fund for?	A word about tax
 Investors who: seek a reasonably consistent level of income; want exposure to Canadian investment grade bonds with a target maturity date; and are investing for the medium term. 	In general, you will have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) or a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA).
	Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered plan, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own, and sell Series F units of the fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. SALES CHARGES

There are no sales charges payable when you buy, switch, or sell Series F units of the fund.

2. FUND EXPENSES

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

The fund's expenses are made up of the management fee, fixed administration fee, any operating expenses not covered by the fixed administration fee (fund costs), and trading costs. The Series F annual management fee is 0.15% and the fixed administration fee is 0.05% of the series' value. Because this series is new, the fund costs and trading costs are not yet available.

More about the trailing commission

No trailing commission is paid in respect of Series F units.

3. OTHER FEES

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch, or convert units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Fee-based arrangements	You can buy Series F units through representative firms who have entered into a Series F agreement with CIBC Asset Management Inc. and who participate in investment programs such as fee-for-service or wrap accounts. Series F units are also available to investors who have accounts with a discount broker (provided the discount broker offers Series F units on its platform). Instead of paying a sales charge, investors purchasing Series F units may pay fees to their representative firm or discount broker for their services.
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 30 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Switch fee	If you sell units of the fund to buy units of another fund managed by us or our affiliates, you may pay a switch fee of up to 2% of the value of units you switch. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
Conversion fee	If you convert units of the fund to another class of units of the same fund, you may pay a conversion fee of up to 2% of the value of units you convert. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
